SHOW SCHEDULE HORTICULTURE DIVISION SECTION I – SPECIAL AWARD CLASSES

Class 1 – African Violet Society of America collections of three (3) different registered varieties, all of the same type: *Standards, standard trailers, or species* (regardless of type). Open only to members of AVSA. Membership card required. One collection per exhibitor.

Class 2 – African Violet Society of America collections of three (3) different registered varieties, all of the same type: *Miniatures, semiminiatures, miniature or semiminiature trailers*. Open only to members of AVSA. Membership card required. One collection per exhibitor.

Class 3 – Magill Cup Award. A collection of five (5) African violets, of different varieties, all of which must be the same type: either standard, miniature, semiminiature, species, or trailers (all five trailers either standard, miniature, or semiminiature). Varieties *need not* be registered. Each plant will be judged and point scored. One collection per exhibitor.

Class 4 - Helen Rhodes Memorial Award. Rob's Scrumptious.

SECTION II - STANDARD AFRICAN VIOLETS, GREEN FOLIAGE

Class 5 – White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid color and two-tone).

Class 6 – Pink, dark pink, rose, and coral (solid color and two-tone).

Class 7 – Red, wine, fuchsia, and plum (solid color and two-tone).

Class 8 – Lavender, mauve, and orchid (solid color and two-tone).

Class 9 – Blue and purple (solid color and two-tone).

Class 10 – Multicolored (two or more different colors).

Class 11 – Fantasy and chimera.

Class 12 – Edged blossoms.

SECTION III – STANDARD AFRICAN VIOLETS, VARIEGATED FOLIAGE

- Class 13 White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 14 Pink, dark pink, rose, and coral (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 15 Red, wine, fuchsia, and plum (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 16 Lavender, mauve, and orchid (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 17 Blue and purple (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 18 Multicolored (two or more different colors).
- Class 19 Fantasy and chimera.
- Class 20 Edged blossoms.

SECTION IV - MINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS

- Class 21 White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 22 Pink, red, fuchsia, coral, and wine (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 23 Blue, purple, lavender, and orchid (solid color and two-tone).

- Class 24 Multicolored, fantasy, chimera, and edged.
- Class 25 All variegated foliage.

SECTION V – SEMIMINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS, GREEN FOLIAGE

- Class 26 White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 27 Pink, red, fuchsia, coral, and wine (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 28 Blue, purple, lavender, and orchid (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 29 Multicolored, fantasy, and chimera.
- Class 30 Edged blossoms

SECTION VI – SEMIMINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS, VARIEGATED FOLIAGE

- Class 31 White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 32 Pink, red, fuchsia, coral, and wine (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 33 Blue, purple, lavender, and orchid (solid color and two-tone).
- Class 34 Multicolored, fantasy, and chimera.
- Class 35 Edged blossoms.

SECTION VII - TRAILERS AND SPECIES, ANY TYPE FOLIAGE

- Class 36 Standard trailers.
- Class 37 Miniature trailers.
- Class 38 Semiminiature trailers.
- Class 39 Saintpaulia species.

SECTION VIII – SPECIAL CLASSES, ANY TYPE FOLIAGE

- Class 40 New cultivars, sports, mutants, and seedlings.
- Class 41 Novice. Open to members who have never entered or who have never won a blue ribbon in any IAVS judged show. Limited to five (5) entries per exhibitor.

Exhibitors entering this class may not enter any other horticulture class.

Class 42 – Plants in unusual, decorative, or novel containers. *One entry per exhibitor*, consisting of one African violet plant (single-crown or trailer) planted in the container.

SECTION IX – GESNERIADS OTHER THAN AFRICAN VIOLETS

- Class 43 Standard Streptocarpus.
- Class 44 Miniature Streptocarpus.
- Class 45 Other gesneriads in bloom.
- Class 46 Gesneriads grown primarily for foliage.
- Class 47 Other miniature gesneriads.

DESIGN DIVISION

SECTION X – INTERPRETIVE FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS

Designs using fresh-cut African violet blossoms and other cut plant material which may be dried, fresh, painted, or treated. Other flowers may be used, providing they do not dominate over, and are in scale with, the African violet.

Class 48 – "Cat Nap" – Do you let your kitties nap in your violet room? Do you brush cat hair off of your plants before a show? Depict your kitty's favorite napping spot, and let your violet be your kitty. To be placed in a white niche measuring 8"H ´8"W ´8"D. One exhibit per member.

Class 49 – "Hounds of Egypt" – It is said that the first domesticated dogs came from Egypt. Create a design celebrating the Egyptian contribution of our canine companions. This design is to be placed in a white niche measuring 12"H ´ 12"W ´ 12"D. One exhibit per member.

Class 50 – "Man's best friend" – They may fetch our paper. They may bring our slippers. They may chew our slippers! Whatever they do we love them because they remain our loyal and loving furry friends. Show your love for your dog(s) with African violets in this design, to be placed in a white niche measuring 28"H ´22"W ´12"D. One exhibit per member. Class 51 – "Here Kitty, Kitty" - Kitties love things that float and move through the air. What better fun for kitty than their own mobile! Don't - test it with your kitties with the violets on. Do - include something that would attract your kitty in this mobile design. A black wooden frame measuring 26"H ´26"W with a center hook will be provided. No backdrop permitted. One exhibit per member.

Class 52 – "Wet your whiskers" – Cats and water, a combination that usually doesn't go together – unless you put something attractive in your bowl that is. No fish allowed, as you know, but an attractive violet might do the trick. Don't let the caption fool you, this one is for the kitties. Other live line material may be used. To be viewed from the front only. One exhibit per member.

SECTION XI – INTERPRETIVE PLANT ARRANGEMENTS

All entries in this section must consist of one or more African violet plants removed from the pot and used in a design. Fresh-cut, dried, treated, painted, and colored plant material may be used. The African violet plant root ball must be concealed. A base or container may be used to hold the arrangement, but designs that might be construed to be dish gardens are to be avoided.

Class 53 – "Kitty's ball of yarn." – We love our kitties. We love our violets. But we don't love our kitties playing with our violets. Give them a ball of yarn to play with instead. But before it ends up under the couch, save some because you'll need it for this design. No maximum, but you must have *some* yarn in this design for kitty to play with. To be placed in a white niche measuring 28"H ´22"W ´12"D. One exhibit per member. Class 54 – "Happiness is a warm puppy." – Anyone that has ever held one knows that's no lie. Warm puppies make you feel all warm and fuzzy inside and out, and like all is right with the world. Keep this feeling of warmth going by creating an arrangement in *all warm colors*. This is to challenge you since most violets are in the cool color range. But, here's a chance to nurture those corals and reds, or whatever fits into your warm color theme. To be placed in a white niche measuring 28"H ´22"W ´12"D. One exhibit per member.

Class 55 – "The cat's meow!" – The cat's pajama's, cool cats, these '60's phrases came about to represent something that is hip, current, and just plain cool. Why? Because cats are cool! Represent your cool cat with a '60's flair when you create this arrangement. A small arrangement to be placed in a white niche measuring 12"H '12"W '12"D. One exhibit per member.

SECTION XII – CONTAINER GARDENS

Each entry is a miniature garden with one or more blooming African violets and other growing plants. No cut plant material is permitted, and accessories are optional. Class 56 – "We are Siamese if you please." Give these fanciful felines a tribute to their homeland by creating a dish garden with that Southeast Asian flair. This dish garden should not to exceed 18" ´ 18". No niche provided. One exhibit per member. Class 57 – "A walk in the park." – What's better than a walk in the park with your favorite doggy on a beautiful spring day? Create a terrarium that depicts your doggy's favorite path through a beautiful park. The terrarium must fit into a 20" ´ 20" space. No niche provided. One exhibit per member.

Class 58 – "Dog days of Summer." – It may be on the beach together. Maybe it's on a

blanket under a tall oak tree. Or perhaps, a walk through the forest is your choice. Create a natural garden which shows us where you like to spend time with your pooch on those dog days of summer. This design must fit into a $20"\ ^20"$ space. No niche provided. One exhibit per member.

SPECIAL EXHIBITS DIVISION SECTION XIII – EDUCATION AND AVSA INFORMATION

Class 59 – Education and AVSA information exhibit. By invitation.

SHOW RULES GENERAL RULES

- 1. Entries will be accepted on Friday, May 16, 2008, between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Entries will also be accepted on Saturday, May 17, 2004, between 8:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. for pre-registered plants ONLY. All pre-registrations must submit completely filled out pre-registration forms, (available in *Leaves*) and be received by Andrea Worrell by May 9, 2008. The Saturday morning entries schedule will be strictly followed. Any late entries will be put on display only.
- 2. Exhibitors must be members of the Illinois African Violet Society.
- 3. The Illinois African Violet Society and the hotel will afford all possible protection to exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 4. Members of the Placement Committee will place all entries in horticulture.
- 5. Commercial members may enter any class in the schedule.
- 6. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 17, 2008. The show will be judged on the merit basis, and only qualified AVSA judges will be permitted to judge. The decision of the judges is final. The schedule is the law of the show.
- 7. During judging, only judges, judges' clerks, Show Chairman, Judges' Chairman, Classification Chairman, Entries Chairman, and Awards Chairman will be permitted in the show room.
- 8. Entries shall not be altered after being judged (except to replace blossoms in designs), and cannot be removed until the close of the show.
- 9. Exhibitors may not remove their entries from the display tables until the official closing of the show at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 17, 2008, or they will forfeit all ribbons and awards.
- **10.** Exhibitors must remove all entries and clean up by 5:00 p.m. or be subject to hotel overtime fees. In addition, showroom access will be closed after 5:00 p.m. May 17, 2008.
- 11. Entries will not be sold in the show room until the closing of the show. Any member wishing to sell exhibits after show closing must wait until the show room is cleared of all the other exhibits. Buyers must remain outside the show room until it is cleared of other exhibits.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION RULES

- 1. All plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three (3) months, and must be clean, healthy plants. All African violet exhibits must be in bloom.
- 2. All plants must be single-crown plants, except species, trailers, and some gesneriads.

- 3. All pots, with the exception of hanging baskets, unusual containers, and gesneriad containers, must be slip-potted in a clean white, green, or neutral-colored pot of the same size as the exhibit is being grown.
- 4. No flared-top pots, supports, or collars will be permitted. Exhibitors must print their names on adhesive sticker and attach this to the bottom of the pot.
- 5. Each variety must be correctly named or it will be subject to correction by the Classification Committee. Any plant not blooming true to the original variety will be entered in the class appropriate to the original variety.
- 6. Any number of plants may be entered in each class by an exhibitor, but only one plant of a variety may be entered in the same class. An exhibitor may enter plants of the same variety in Classes 1 through 4 and Class 42 as in Classes 5 through 39.
- 7. Class 40 entries must be accompanied by a 3" ´5" card stating that the entry is originally from seed or from mutation. Mutations or sports should be entered as "Sport of (name of original plant)." Entries in this class must never have been exhibited in an IAVS show before.
- 8. Only blue-ribbon plants will be eligible for special awards. Any blue-ribbon plant in classes 1–4 will be eligible for any other awards.

DESIGN DIVISION RULES

- 1. African violet plants and other plant material used need not have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. Artificial plant material or live creatures may not be used. The American flag may not be used.
- 3. Bases and accessories may be used in all classes unless otherwise stated.
- 4. Each exhibit in the Design Division must be accompanied by a 3" ´5" card stating the class title, varieties of African violet(s) used, and all other plant material used in the design.
- 5. Exhibitors may have only one entry per class, but may enter as many classes as they wish, providing space is available. Reservations for entry space in the Design Division will be open April 8, 2008, and will close May 8, 2008. Space will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis, and must be made in writing. IMPORTANT NICHE INFORMATION

The actual measurement of the IAVS larger niches is 28"H ´22"W ´7"D. The 7" deep is a flange used to support the niche when open. Your design when using the large niche should not exceed 12" deep.

The niche measuring 12"H ´12"W ´12"D is as stated, and your design must fit inside that measurement.

The miniature niche actually measures $8"H \ 8"W$, with a 6" flange, but your design must fit into an $8"H \ 8"W \ 8"D$ space.

The judges will take these measurements into consideration when judging.

50 Years Ago:

The Taylorville African Violet Society offered the Taylorville Cup, to be awarded to the novice grower with the highest-scoring plant (90 points or above)..

There were eight accredited judges among the IAVS members.

"Fall Finale of African Violets" was the theme of the Society's last fall show in Rockford in 1957. Beginning in 1958, IAVS switched to a spring show, with "Spring in Springfield" being the first spring show.

25 Years Ago:

The Fall Get-Together was sponsored by the Quad Cities AVS, with Ruth Tiedeman presenting a program on "Artistic Design."

The spring 1983 show, "Melody of Violets," was hosted by the AVS of Northern Illinois, with Adelle Johnson as Show Chairman. it was held at the Rodeway Inn in Chicago.

10 Years Ago:

The Fall Get-Together was hosted by the Margaret Scott AVS, with programs by Gary Mikita on Streptocarpus and Chris Poore on Miniature African Violets

IAVS put in a bid to host the 2001 AVSA Convention and Show. On the Advisory Committee were Carol Allegretti, Steve Covolo, Andrea Worrell, Anna Jean Landgren, and Joe Bruns.

"Your Hit Parade of Violets" was the theme of the 1998 show, held at the Holiday Inn of Elgin, with Ellie Palm and Jean Willey as Co-Chairmen.

Tom Moore will be the new Editor of Leaves magazine.
