# From the Archives...

by Joe Bruns

These excerpts have been taken from old issues of *Leaves* magazine.

**50 Years Ago** – November/December 1956 and January/February 2007 issues:

On the covers were photos of one of the designs and Best in Show (Pink Ideal, shown at left) exhibited at the first IAVS show.

An article on fertilizers was written by Ada Magill. Most of her advice is still pertinent today. Not much has changed over 50 years.

New members who joined during this four-month period — 156. Total membership today —85. What a difference 50 years makes!

There was a list of 47 new varieties and their descriptions, including several of the new full double pinks.



#### **25 Years Ago** – Winter 1981 issue:

Among the new members were Carol Sharits, the Radiant African Violet Sodiety (Rockford) and the Purple Thumbs African Violet Society (Naperville).

Membership dues were raised from \$3.50 to \$5.00 per year.

The passing of Helen Rhoades, the first President of IAVS, was announced.

Approval was given to pay for repairs to the typewriter of the Membership Secretary.

The 1982 show was announced, with a theme of "Violets Along the Sac Trail," to be held at the Holiday Inn in Joliet, with Jean Willey and Ellie Palm as co-chairmen.

#### 10 Years Ago – Winter 1996 issue:

Sandy Stubbings reported on three programs to be presented on TCI cable TV in the coming months, featuring Carol Allegretti, Steve Covolo, Anna Jean Landgren, Jean Willey, and Tracy Bruns.

Tom Moore (Show Chairman) invited members to the spring show and convention, hosted by the Glenview/North Shore AVS. The show will be held in Palatine, Illinois, with a theme of "Let's Party With Violets,"

#### SECTION I - AVSA Collections & Special Awards CLASSES

**Class 1** - AVSA Collection of three (3) different registered standard varieties all of the same type (three single crown or three trailers) or three different species, regardless of type.

Class 2 - African Violet Society of America Collection of three (3) different registered type (three single crown miniatures, three miniature trailers, three single crown semiminiatures, three semiminiature trailers).

**Class 3** - Magill Cup Award. A collection of five (5) African violets, of different varieties, all of which must be the same type, either standard, miniature, semiminiature, species, or trailers (all five trailers either standard, miniature, or semiminiature). Varieties *need not* be registered. Each plant will be judged and point scored. One collection per exhibitor

Class 4 - Helen Rhodes Award - Buffalo Hunt

Class 12 - Blue, purple, plum, lavender, mauve, and orchid (solid & two-tone)

Class 13 - Multicolor and edged.

Class 14 - Fantasy and chimera.

#### SECTION IV - MINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS

Class 15 - White, cream, blush, yellow and green (solid & two-tone)

Class 16 - Pink, rose, coral, red, wine, and fuchsia (solid & two-tone)

Class 17 - Blue, purple, plum, lavender, mauve and orchid (solid & two-tone)

Class 18 - Multicolored and edged.

Class 19 - Fantasy and chimera.

Class 20 - All variegated foliage.

#### SECTION V - SEMIMINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS, GREEN FOLIAGE

Class 21 - White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid & two-tone)

Class 22 - Pink, rose, coral, red, wine, and fuchsia (solid & two-tone)

Class 23 - Blue, purple, plum, lavender, mauve and orchid (solid & two-tone)

Class 24 - Multicolored and edged.

Class 25 - Fantasy and chimera.

#### SECTION VI - SEMIMINIATURE AFRICAN VIOLETS, VARIEGATED FOLIAGE

Class 26 - White, cream, blush, yellow, and green (solid & two-tone)

Class 27 - Pink, red, coral and wine (solid & two-tone)

Class 28 - Blue, purple, lavender, and orchid (solid & two-tone)

Class 29 - Multicolored and edged.

Class 30 - Fantasy and chimera.

# SECTION VII - TRAILERS, SPECIES, VINTAGE, NATURAL LIGHT VIOLETS, ANY TYPE BLOSSOM, ANY TYPE FOLIAGE

Class 31 - Standard, Miniature & Semiminiature Trailers.

Class 32 - Saintpaulia species.

Class 33 - Vintage Violets (registered or recorded prior to November 1982)

Class 34 - Natural Light Violets (grown in sunlight)

#### SECTION VIII - SPECIAL CLASSES, ANY TYPE FOLIAGE

Class 35 - New cultivars, sports, mutants, and seedlings.

**Class 36** - Plants in unusual, decorative, containers. One entry per exhibitor, consisting of one African violet plant (single-crown or trailer) planted in the container.

#### SECTION IX - GESNERIADS OTHER THAN AFRICAN VIOLETS

**Class 37** - Miniature gesneriads in bloom (up to 5 inches in any dimensions; may be displayed in a protective container, cover permitted).

**Class 38 -** Miniature gesneriads grown for ornamental foliage (up to 5 inches in any dimensions; may be displayed in a protective container, cover permitted).

Class 39 - Episcias (blooming)

Class 40 - Streptocarpus (blooming)

Class 41 - Blooming gesneriads other than episcias & streptocarpus.

**Class 42** - Gesneriads grown for ornamental foliage (may be displayed in a protective container, cover permitted)

#### **DESIGN DIVISION**

A 3 x 5 card must accompany each entry, listing all plant materials used. Exhibits should not exceed the limits of the dimensions given for each class.

#### **SECTION X - INTERPRETIVE FLOWER DESIGNS**

**Class 43 - "Amuse-bouches" -** These are the tiny bite-sized morsels served before the hors d'oeuvre or first course of a meal. These, often accompanied with a complementary wine, are served as an enticement to the taste buds as preparation for the meal and to offer the guests a glimpse into the chef's approach to cooking.

With your imagination, whet viewer's appetites (for the designs) with a miniature design that looks good enough to eat.

To fit in a 8" x 8" x 8" niche space.

Class 44 - "Life is uncertain, Eat dessert first" - This is a phrase that has become popular. Dessert is a course that typically comes at the end of a meal, usually consisting of sweet food. Before the 19th-century rise of the middle class, and the mechanization of the sugar industry, sweets were a privilege of the aristocracy, or a rare holiday treat. As sugar became cheaper and more readily available, the development and popularity of desserts spread accordingly.

Satisfy our sweet tooth in this underwater arrangement with a delectable dessert. To fit a space under 20 inches. No niche provided. To be viewed from the front only. One exhibit per member.

Class 45 - "High Tea" - The term high tea is sometimes used in the United States to refer to afternoon tea or the tea party, a very formal, ritualized gathering, usually of ladies, in which tea, thin sandwiches and little cakes are served on the best China. This form of tea is increasingly served in high-end U.S. hotels, often during the Christmas holidays and other tourist seasons, and a rising number of big-city teahouses, where it is usually correctly described as Afternoon Tea.

This is a tea cup design. You might want to use your finest China while serving up this arrangement.

To be placed in a niche 28"H x 22"W x 12"D. One exhibit per member.

Class 46 - "Surf 'n' Turf" - This delectable main course, particularly common in North American steakhouses which combines seafood and meat, usually American lobster tail or shrimp and steak. The term originated along the Atlantic coast of North America. Its earliest known published use is in a 1967 advertisement in the Buffalo, New York Yellow Pages, placed by a restaurant called Michael's House of Steaks.

This design asks you to take Surf 'n' Turf to new heights. Supply your own materials for this mobile. To fit in a niche 28"H x 22"H x 15"D. One exhibit per member.

#### **SECTION XI - INTERPRETIVE PLANT DESIGNS**

Class 47 - "Champagne and Caviar" - Champaign has launched thousands of ships, toasted billions of weddings and special occasions, complimented countless parties, and shared untold special moments between people. Champagne is the wine of celebration. No other wine is so associated with joy and festivity. Its meaning and appeal are universal. Caviar is the processed, salted roe of certain species of fish, most notably the sturgeon. It is commercially marketed worldwide as a delicacy and is principally eaten as either a garnish or a spread; for example, with hors d'oeuvre. Given its high price in America, champagne and caviar is synonymous with luxury and wealth. Create a luxurious Floral planting design using gold and black in this design. To be placed in a niche measuring 12"H x 12"W x 12"D. One exhibit per member.

**Class 48 - "Violets & Sausages" -** Can you think what these two things have in common? This class has a puzzle that leads to a common link between Joe Bruns, African violets, and sausages. If your design contains the answer to the puzzle, you will win a prize.

In America the different cultures enjoy their particular tastes, Polish, Bratwurst, Bangers, and good old Jimmy Dean sausage. But one thing remains the same. . . the shapes. In this design use the shapes most commonly seen in sausage, round, links and patties.

To fit in a niche 28"H x 22"W x 12"D. One exhibit per member.

#### **SECTION XII - CONTAINER GARDENS**

Class 49 - "Truffles" - Of the many varieties of truffles some of the most famous are the

Italian white truffle, the French black truffle, the summer black truffle, and the March truffle. The white truffle, often referred to as the white diamond, is considered the most rare and demands the highest price. Pound for pound, the white truffle is the second most expensive food in the world. Gourmands covet it. During the peak of the white truffle season, which only runs from late October to early December, the tubers can fetch U.S. \$1,200 to \$2,300 a pound.

Design a terrarium reflecting the gourmand in you. We'll be looking for your white truffle (this doesn't mean you have to use a white violet) amongst the vegetation.

To fit a 20" x 20" space. No niche provided. One exhibit per member.

Class 50 - "Trail Mix" - This is a popular snack food commonly used in outdoor recreational activities such as hiking, backpacking, mountaineering and camping, although we believe the wealthiest CEO's have also been known to enjoy this snack. The world record for eating trail mix was set in 2004 when Mark Lidzbarski ate his own body weight, over 200 pounds, over the course of Labor Day weekend. While we don't consider trail mix a "fine edible," I'm sure that there are some connoisseurs who would disagree.

Your Trail Mix should be an "tasteful" assortment of plants that highlight African violet trailers in this natural planting. To fit into a 20" x 20" space. One exhibit per member.

Class 51 - "A Violet Picnic" - Picnics are often family oriented but can also include romantic picnics, large get-togethers, company picnics and church picnics. On romantic and family picnics a picnic basket and a blanket are usually included. Outdoor games or some other form of entertainment are also common at large picnics.

Invite us to your picnic in this dish garden that fits in a 20" x 20" space. No niche provided. One exhibit per member.

#### SECTION XIII - Educational and AVSA Information

CLASS 52 - Education display and AVSA promotional information - by invitation only.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

1. Entries will be accepted on Friday, April 27, 2007, between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Entries will also be accepted on Saturday, April 28, 2007, between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. *for pre-registered plants ONLY.* To pre-register, contact Judi Du Pont

The Saturday morning entries schedule will be strictly followed. Any late entries will be put on display only.

- 2. Exhibitors must be members of the Illinois African Violet Society.
- 3. Members of the Placement Committee will place all entries in Horticulture.
- 4. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday April 28, 2007. The show will be judged on the merit basis, and only qualified AVSA judges will be permitted to judge. The decision of the judges is final. The schedule is the law of the show.
- 5. During judging, only judges, judges' clerks, Show Chairman, Judges' Chairman, Classification Chairman, Entries Chairman, and Awards Chairman will be permitted in the show room.
- 6. Entries shall not be altered after being judged (except to replace blossoms in designs), and cannot be removed until the close of the show.
- 7. Exhibitors may not remove their entries from the display tables until the official closing of the show at 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 28, 2007, or they will forfeit all ribbons and awards.
- 8. Entries sold in the show room cannot be removed until the closing of the show.

#### HORTICULTURE DIVISION RULES

- 1. All plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three (3) months prior to January 27, 2007 and must be clean, healthy plants. All African violet exhibits must be in bloom.
- 2. All plants must be single-crown plants, except species, trailers, and some gesneriads.
- 3. All pots, with the exception of hanging baskets, unusual containers, and gesneriads containers, must be slip-potted in a clean white, green, or neutral-colored pot of the same size as the exhibit is being grown.
- 4. No flared-top pots, supports, or collars will be permitted. Exhibitors must print their names on an adhesive sticker and attach this to the bottom of the pot.
- 5. Each variety must be correctly named or it will be subject to correction by the Classification Committee. Any plant not blooming true to the original variety will be entered in the class appropriate to the original variety.
- 6. Any number of plants may be entered in each class by an exhibitor, but only one plant of a variety may be entered in the same class. An exhibitor may enter plants of the same variety in Classes 1 through 4 and as in Classes 5 through 36.
- 7. Class 36 entries must be accompanied by a 3" x 5" card stating that the entry is originally from seed or from mutation. Mutations or sports should be entered as "Sport of (name of original plant)."
- 8. Only blue-ribbon plants will be eligible for special awards. Any blue-ribbon plant in classes 1 4 will be eligible for any other awards.

#### **DESIGN DIVISION RULES**

- 1. African violet plants and other plant material used need not have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. Artificial plant material or live creatures may not be used. The American flag or flags of other countries may not be used.
- 3. Bases and accessories may be used in all classes unless otherwise stated.
- 4. Each exhibit in the Design Division must be accompanied by a 3" x 5" card stating the class title, varieties of African violets used, and other plant material used in the design.
- 5. Exhibitors may have only one entry per class, but may enter as many classes as they wish, providing space is available.

#### IMPORTANT NICHE INFORMATION

The actual size of the IAVS larger niches is  $28^{\circ}$  H x  $22^{\circ}$  W x  $7^{\circ}$  D. The  $7^{\circ}$  deep is a flange used to support the niche when open. Your design when using the large niche should not exceed  $12^{\circ}$  deep. The niche measuring  $12^{\circ}$  H x  $12^{\circ}$  W x  $12^{\circ}$  D is as stated, and your design must fit inside that measurement. The miniature niche actually measures  $8^{\circ}$  H x  $8^{\circ}$  W, with a  $6^{\circ}$  flange, but your design must fit into an  $8^{\circ}$  H x  $8^{\circ}$  W x  $8^{\circ}$  D space.

The size of the niche for kinetic arrangements is 28"H x 22"W x 15"D.

The judges will take these measurements into consideration when judging.
